The man was taken to Murwillumbah District Hospital before being transferred to the Gold

Coast Hospital for yesterday's surgery.

The second man allegedly left the scene prior to the arrival of emergency services.

Following investigations, a 35-year-old Murwillumbah man attended Murwillumbah Police Station about 11.30am yester-

He was arrested and taken to Tweed Heads Police Station where he was charged with reckless wounding, assault occasioning actual bodily harm and affray.

He has been granted condition bail to appear at Murwillumbah Local Court on Wednesday, November
